Health Services Information – Fact-sheet by Citizens Information Service

The Irish population is divided into two groups for the purposes of their eligibility for health services - medical card holders and non-medical card holders. There have been a number of changes to medical card entitlements in the recent past. This fact-sheet gives a broad outline of the types of medical cards and other health service entitlements. Readers should seek additional information or advice from their *Citizens Information Services*

Types of Medical Cards:

General Medical Card — based on income under a certain means and gives entitlement to a range of health services free of charge. The means is related to status (single/married, partner/lone parent) age, the number of dependents and makes allowances for rent/mortgage, child care costs, travel to work etc. Medical card holders are exempt from the 2% Health Levy and the 1% Employment Levy. (Example: a couple with 2 children, under 16 the income level is €342.50 per week without allowances listed above included) GP services and prescribed drugs and medicines; public hospital services; dental services; optical services and aural services; maternity and infant care services; a range of community care and personal social services.

(note that where there are exceptional medical expenses incurred by a family the HSE has discretion to issue a medical card)

<u>Doctor Only Medical Card (GP Visit Card</u>) - Unless you have a medical card, visits to GPs (family doctors) are not free. You may qualify for a GP Visit Card It is means tested, but the income limits are higher than for the medical card. (Example: a couple with 2 children, under 16 an income level of €504.00 without the allowances included)

Medical Cards for the Over 70s - Between 2001 and 2008, everyone over aged 70 was entitled to a medical card without a means test. From January 2009 there are **gross** income limits of €700 per week for a single person and €1,400 per week for a married couple. There will be no standard deductions allowable (for example, for income tax). Please note the discretionary rule still applies.

<u>EU Medical Cards</u> - You may be entitled to a medical card under EU Regulations if you are living in Ireland and receiving a social security payment from another EU/EEA country or Switzerland and you are **not** getting an Irish social welfare payment (apart from Child Benefit or Early Childcare Supplement).

Medical Cards & Returning to Work - if you are receiving a social welfare payment and return to work

you may retain your medical card for up to 3 years.

Medical Cards & Students - Full-time students aged 16-25 who are financially dependent on their parents are normally only entitled to a medical card if their parents have one. Students who are financially independent of their parents, for example, who have income from part-time work, and who satisfy the means test may be entitled to a medical card.

Medical Cards & Cancer Patients: - General means tested rules apply, however, based on medicines and additional costs a medical card may be issued at the discretion of the HSE. Subsidised travel costs are also available in addition to the range of Community Care Services. There are a number of Support Groups in the county.

Non-Medical Card holders

If you do not have a medical card, you are entitled to free public hospital services but you may have to pay in-patient and out-patient hospital charges. You are also entitled to subsidised prescribed drugs and medicines and maternity and infant care services and you may be entitled to free or subsidised community care and personal social services. Visiting an Accident & Emergency Department of a hospital incurs a charge of €100.00 with a doctor's letter. (Private Health Insurance is not dealt with in this fact-sheet)

<u>Drugs Payment Scheme</u> – Under this scheme an Individual or family has to pay only the first €100.00 per month for all approved prescribed drugs, medicines and appliances to be used by that person for family in that month.

<u>The Long Term Illness Scheme</u> – People with any of the following conditions can obtain the necessary drugs and medicines for the treatment of that condition free of charge and is NOT means tested - Mental handicap; Mental illness (for people under 16 only); Diabetes insipidus; Diabetes mellitus; Haemophilia; Cerebral palsy; Phenylketonuria; Epilepsy; Cystic fibrosis; Multiple sclerosis; Spina bifida; Muscular dystrophies; Hydrocephalus; Parkinsonism; Acute leukemia; Conditions arising from use of Thalidomide


<u>Children</u> – Children attending school referred from child health and school service examinations and found to have eyesight or hearing problems are referred to the appropriate consultant for treatment. The service is free and continues until the child reaches 16 years of age. Orthodontic treatment is also available depending on the severity.

Mobility Allowance - Is a means tested monthly payment by the HSE to people aged between 16 and

66 who have a disability and are unable to walk or use public transport and who would benefit from a change in surroundings. The Higher rate is €208.50 per month and the Lower rate €104.25 (in receipt of Disabled Drivers/Passengers Scheme)

Motorised Transport Grant - Is a means tested HSE payment for people with disabilities who need to buy a car. It is also for disabled people who need to have a car or other vehicle adapted in order to enable them to drive and, as a result, earn a living. The maximum grant is $\[\in \] 5,020.50.$

Blind Welfare Allowance - Is part of special services for blind or visually impaired people. The means tested allowance is paid to eligible people from 18 years of age. The rates are €63.60 Single or €127.20 for a Couple.
