



The prospect of becoming unemployed is a daunting experience for most of us. In the current economic climate Citizens Information Services are aware of the increasing number of contacts from clients seeking information and advice on their entitlements; with regard to becoming unemployed and the supports that are available to people in this situation. The enclosed information gives a general overview of your rights in the lead up to losing your job and the welfare supports to which you may have an entitlement. **Donegal Citizens Information Service** can assist you with further information and advice on these matters and other issues and entitlements.

Notice: You have an entitlement to notice, except in special circumstances, if you are being let go from your job in Ireland i.e. you must be informed when your job will end. There is a minimum entitlement laid down by law but you must have been working for your employer for at least 13 weeks e.g if you have worked for your employer for over two years you are entitled to 2 weeks notice. Your contract may give you a greater entitlement to notice than the statutory minimum, but it cannot give you less.

Holiday pay: If your employment is ending, you are entitled to receive a payment for annual leave which you have earned but not taken. The payment should equal the amount that would have been paid had the annual leave been taken. The ending of employment is the only situation where it is legal to pay an employee instead of giving annual leave.

Public holiday: If your employment stops during the week ending on the day before a public holiday and you have worked for your employer for the previous 4 weeks, you should receive an additional day's pay for the public holiday. This also applies to part-time employees who have established a right to the public holiday by working at least 40 hours in the previous 5 weeks.

Redundancy: Generally a redundancy situation arises if your job ceases to exist and you are not replaced. You may be entitled to a Redundancy Payment if you have a set period of service with the employer, (you must have worked for a minimum of 2 years). Short time and lay offs can also lead to a situation of redundancy. Not all workers are entitled to this statutory redundancy payment, even where a redundancy situation exists, for example the self-employed sub contractors. If you do qualify for redundancy there are specific Redundancy Procedures which employers and employees must


follow in order to comply with the legislation. It is recommended that you seek information and advice on the procedures.

P45 - When you leave your job your Employer must give you a P45. This is a statement of your pay and the tax and PRSI to date deducted by your employer. It is a very important document and vou need it to claim a tax refund and to claim social welfare benefits. If you are on short time or lay-off you should get a letter from your employer.

Tax Rebate: You should apply 4 weeks from the date you become unemployed, however, if emergency tax was being deducted by your former employer you should apply immediately. Your application for a tax repayment because you are unemployed must be made on tax repayment Form P50 and sent to your district tax office with Parts 2 and 3 of your P45.

Jobseekers Benefit: Jobseeker's Benefit is a weekly payment made to people who are out of work and covered by social insurance (PRSI). You must have a certain number of paid PRSI contributions (stamps) to qualify and the current rates are €197.80 (€204.30 in 2009) You may also be eligible for payments for a Qualified adult and Child. Jobseeker's Benefit was known as Unemployment Benefit. If you are getting Jobseeker's Benefit, you may be entitled to: Mortgage Interest Supplement or Rent Supplement - a means tested payment from the Community Welfare Officer at your local health



Unemployment and Entitlements Cont.. Information supplied by Citizen's Information Service

Local Authority Housing: Inform your local authority that your income has reduced as this may reduce the amount of rent you pay.

Medical Card: If your income is below certain a level, you may get a medical card. It covers you for free doctor's care, approved prescriptions etc. For example, the basic income level for a couple and one child is € 342.50. Other expenses can be taken into account include rent and mortgage payments and travel.

Back to School Clothing and Footwear

Allowance - a payment designed to help towards the cost of uniforms and footwear for children who are attending school. The scheme is payable between June and September each year - the claim should be made before the end of September. Contact your local health centre.

Jobseeker's Allowance: You may get Jobseeker's Allowance if you don't qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit. Jobseeker's Allowance is means-tested and vour means must be below a certain level to qualify. If you are getting Jobseeker's Allowance, you may be entitled to:


Fuel Allowance - a weekly payment between October and April to help with fuel costs

(payable with Jobseeker's Allowance after 15 months) Mortgage Interest Supplement or Rent Supplement, Local Authority housing, Medical Card, Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance (Details same as for Jobseekers Benefit see above)

Interim Payments: While you are waiting for your Jobseekers Benefit or Allowance and you do not have enough money to meet your needs you can apply to the Community Welfare Officer for an interim payment. This is a means tested payment. Further information available at the following centres:

AFROSCOPE By Michael Abiola-Phillips "Though tribe, tongue and accent may differ, in brotherhood we stand".

LET US EDUCATE TOGETHER

There is no doubt about it. Putting an old wine in a new bottle is "rebranding" of the same old product, but getting a new wine into an old bottle or container is all about CHANGE": A change for a new or better taste may be a possibility for a better experience or newer innovation. It is about life and permanency. The theory is much related or similar in comparison to the whole world's philosophy about the slogan "Yes we can". Of course, ves, we can change, oh! Yes we can learn together from the attitude of the white American folks who has been able to teach the whole world the true meaning of Democracy, Humanity, Equality and Liberation. The lesson learnt is all based on acceptance; togetherness, and respect for "human race". Since the creation of man, human race, the only race known to the Supreme Being has been on the struggle for dominance over one another. Though, the biblical injunction made it very clear in Genesis 1 verse 26 that man should take dominance only on animals, birds and other lesser creatures but not on his mates or fellow humans.

The National Action Plan against Racism defines racism as a specific form of discrimination and exclusion faced by cultural and ethnic minorities. Racism denies people their basic human rights, dignity and respect. Whereas, race is an arbitrary and invented way to group people arising from colonialism, and Neo-Colonialism to attribute superiority to dominant races. In Ireland, all these are embraced by the duties and responsibilities of the Garda Siochana and through the provision of the Equality Authority established in 1998, with all these efforts, the government and the concerned thus expect a good relationship and respect developing between regardless of ethnicity.

Perhaps, as a checklist, let me state that racism reflects, when you are abusively spoken to or called "Names" when you are publicly isolated or ignored for no other reasons, when you are socially, economically or administratively excluded in the scheme of things, when you are intimidated against because of your language or because of the way you speak your own English language. Whenever, you notice any trace of inequality, then you are faced with "Chronic" racism. When judgement are based on your skin colour and not on fact of the matter or on the level of your intelligence, arguments, points or credentials', when people through

actions, attitudes or verbally tells you to go back to your country. All these could be very hurting. Indeed, the effect and consequences of racism is enormous. Sometimes you pretend that its not there. Sometimes you feel angered and the thought of hatred runs through. Other times, you feel sad and alone, this feelings often times makes one to withdraw and loss confidence.

It's of a fact that institutional racism is the collective failure of an organisation to provide an appropriate and professional service to people because of their colour, culture or ethnic origin which can be seen or detected in processes, attitudes and behaviour which amount to discrimination through unwitting prejudice, ignorance, thoughtlessness, and racist stereotyping which disadvantages minority ethnic people. Developing a more inclusive and intercultural society is about inclusion by design, understanding, equality of opportunity and respect. Let us therefore work on our lives, our children and our children and our future. The greatest evil to humanity is hatred, exploitation, corruption, greed, discrimination and racism. In the past recent months, the American real winners at the presidential polls were the whites voters, they could easily have ignored all those extra ordinary attributes of Obama and allow themselves to be blinded by apparent sentiments, but instead, they have risen above the frivolities, they have been realistic and objective. They proved that colour or kind should no longer be prominent enough to limit horizon. Of course, we have all learnt a lesson here that hard work and integrity will lead to goals, attainment and not colour,

This phenomenon also has focused the searchlight on the reasonability of the fellow blacks and people of other shades in this universe to confirm whether we are at the same state of mental readiness of Obama, or of those matured white voters, or are we too busy being black than being human. 
